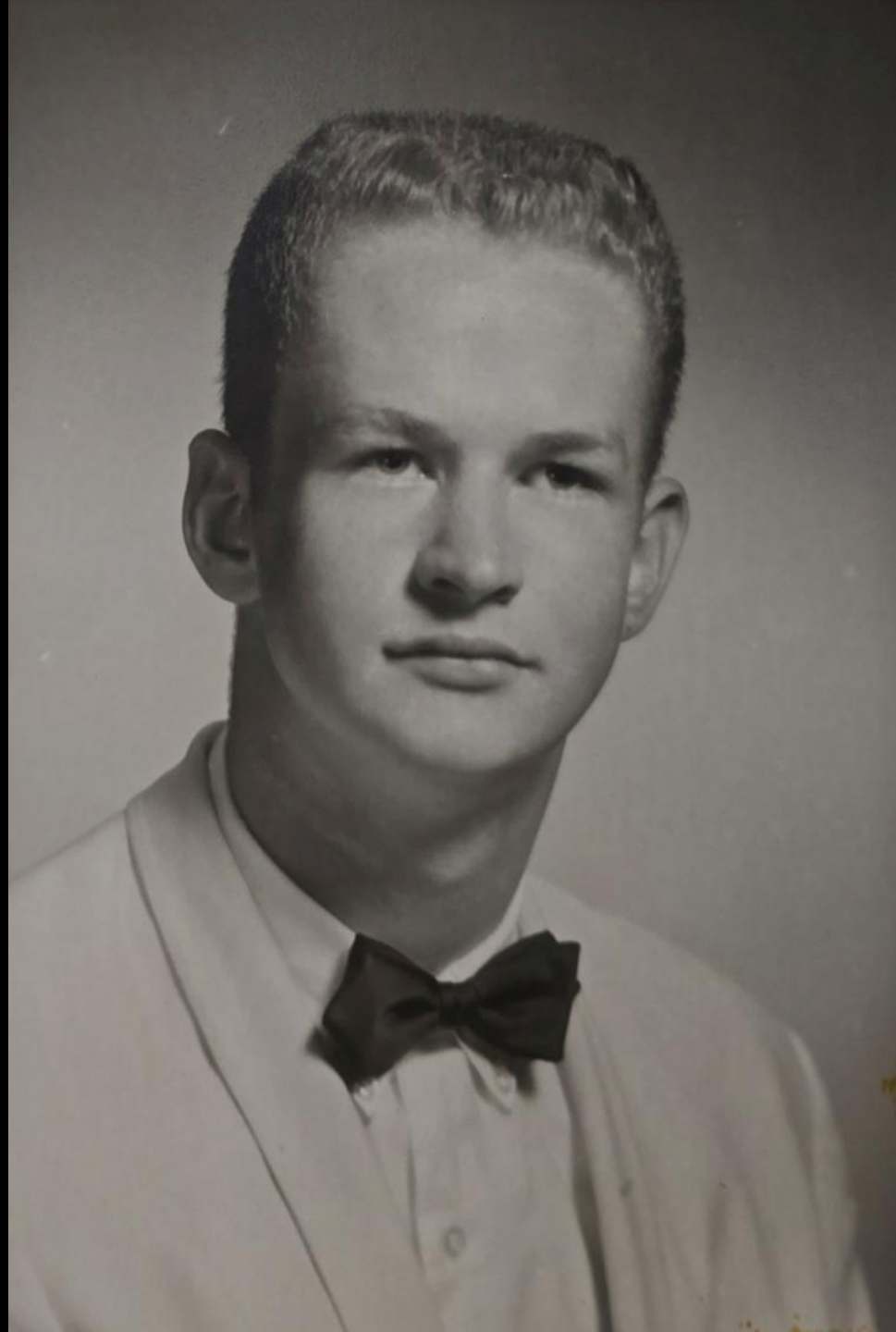

Mrs. Cornelius Kirby has hung up her youngster's laundry all over the world.

But she's happiest when the washline is in her own backyard in Queens.

The wife of a construction engineer, the Douglaston mother has set up 22 homes . . . in as many countries . . . since her marriage 11 years ago.

"Seeing the world is an invaluable education," says Mrs. Kirby, a former book illustrator who dabbles in archaeology in her spare time.

"And it's given me chance to explore and sketch places that to me were once just dots on the map."

BUT the end of a perfect trip, she said, is when the family anchors at "home port" . . . their comfortable grey frame house at 47-17 244th street.

"We call ourselves the Kirby caravan," said the globetrotting homemaker, pointing to her youngsters, Dolores, 9; Margaret, 7; Peter, 3, and 5-month-old Cornelia.

Each of the Kirby children was raised in a different country.

"The longest we've ever stayed in one place," she said, "was two years in Suez."

"We just about get settled when my husband is transferred again. Right now, we're waiting to pack up and head for the Bayou country in Louisiana."

"But I hope it won't be for awhile yet," she added. "I'd like the children to get acquainted with their home."

THE FORMER Anne Pracny, Mrs. Kirby was raised in Hollis, where her parents still reside. She met her husband while they were students at Cooper Union.

She later taught art at Manhattanville College.

"Someday," she said, "I hope we'll settle down and make Douglaston our permanent address."

But until that time, the Kirby caravan might be found anywhere from Queens to Cairo.
